

To Whom It May Concern:

I first met Kevin when he was seeing my husband for home health physical therapy. He noted how I had to drag myself and my right leg while laying over my walker to get to my chair.

Kevin asked me what was wrong. I told him, approximately 10 years ago I had cancer in my lower leg and had to have my lymph nodes removed, which caused my leg to swell 2-3 times the size of my other leg. In fact the swelling was so bad I had to wear a size 9 shoe on my right foot; my shoe size is 7.

Then approximately four years ago, I had a total knee replacement, which went well. But while getting out of the bath I fell, broke my right leg and tore my muscle in the front of my leg completely off the knee.

I told Kevin my pain was so violent that most days I could not put weight on my right foot and was chair-fast most of the day. That's when Kevin said he could reduce my pain by 50%. Well! I did not believe this. Having been in physical therapy for seven months and having seen six different therapists, I had no faith any physical therapist could ever help me. In fact, previous therapy caused me more pain and I didn't see any success.

After one treatment with Kevin I noticed a difference. With the massage therapist, Terry, I noticed a decrease in my swelling. By the end of my first treatment I also had a decrease in pain. This had not happened in over seven months at other clinics.

After four or five treatments I noted that three large and very hard lumps behind my knee were gone!!

I am now able to stand with full weight on my right leg with little to no pain. I'm able to walk with my walker with little to no pain. The swelling in my leg has decreased so significantly that I am able to wear a size 7 shoe on my right foot.

My success with Kevin is so great. At 75 years old I drive two hours from Moses Lake to see him.

I thank God for Kevin and his massage therapist.

With all the success I made, I believe the goal of walking with a cane is achievable. I can't thank Kevin and his crew enough.
